

10 STEPS TO PLANNING YOUR NOVEL

#1 DEFINE YOUR GENRE & AUDIENCE

- Decide on the genre:
 mystery/suspense,
 romance/rom-com,
 thriller, fantasy, sci-fi, etc.
- Identify your target audience: what does your reader look like age, focus, interests.

#2 - CHOOSE A PREMISE/CONCEPT

- Define your central idea or concept - what is the story you want to tell?
- What message/theme do you want to convey for example: good vs. evil, coming of age, loyalty, friendship, justice, family.

#3 CREATE MEMORABLÈ CHARACTERS

- Give your characters depth flaws, complex feelings/wants.
- Think about your character's background these shape our characters and guide them.
- Make sure your character isn't perfect.
